EARLY LIFE

1910-1924

- Born in present day West Bengal, he shifted to Kanpur where he met Shaheed Bhagat Singh and the two became thick friends.
- Joined hands with Bhagat Singh to become active member of Hindustan Socialist Republic Association. (HSRA)

BOMBING THE CENTRAL ASSEMBLY

1929

- To subdue revolutionaries, the British Government decided to implement Defense of India Act 1915 which gave police a free hand.
- To register their protest, Dutt along with Bhagat Singh threw 2 bombs inside the assembly and shouted slogans "Inquilab Zindabad" and showered Leaflets.
- The bombing was symbolic and they ensured there were no human injuries.

TRIAL 1930

- Arrested and Deported to Cellular Jail, Andaman And Nicobar.
- After release, contracted Tuberculosis, but nonetheless participated in Quit India Movement and again jailed for 4 years.
- Lived his last years without recognition and in destitution.
